CCP will host a Palestinian/ Jewish dialogue Sunday, Nov. 3

The phone call came from a friend, asking for a favor.

Dr. Miriam Zimmerman, who was dean of my department at Notre Dame de Namur University and the person who hired me to teach journalism there 25 years ago, knows the Congregational Church of the Peninsula well. She was one of the eulogists for Pastor Kristi at her memorial.

But the request, from her perspective as a member of Congregation Beth Jacob in Redwood City, was a big one:

CBJ had been planning to host a Palestinian/Jewish Dialogue on Oct. 20 for several months and had enlisted the support of the Peninsula Multifaith Coalition. However, they had received a directive from a national Jewish organization: Please avoid any public gatherings out of recognition that the current situation in Israel, Gaza and Lebanon had significantly heightened tensions for Jews across the country.

The ask: Would CCP host the dialogue instead of Congregation Beth Jacob?

I told Miriam that Oct. 20 (Chocolate Sunday!) wouldn't work, but if they could consider another Sunday, I would carry her request to Pastor Jim Mitulski.

She conferred with her committee at CBJ about dates, and we settled on Nov. 3 as a possibility. Pastor Jim was enthusiastic, and PMC was pleased to see that the program would go forward.

The program was arranged by the Jewish-Palestinian Living Room Dialogue

We will celebrate our loved ones whom we no longer see vet who live still in our hearts on All Saints and All Souls Sunday Nov. 3. Bring pictures and small mementos for the altar.

We'll welcome back Garrett House for his first sermon since formally entering the ordination process of the United Church of Christ Nov. 17. We'll have several opportunities to offer thanks to God for all of the blessings we have received and continue to receive.

I especially want to invite you to the Jewish/Palestinian Dialogue that we are hosting for Congregation Beth Jacob on Nov. 3. For a variety of reasons it was deemed safer for this dialogue to take place in the peacemaking sanctuary of our church.

For the past year, voices from Israel, Palestine, Gaza, the West Bank, Lebanon, Iran and throughout the Middle East and around the world have combined to pray for an immediate multilateral ceasefire.

We have prayed for a safe return and accounting of the 60-100 remaining hostages. And we have mourned the 1,200 Israelis and the 40,000 Palestinians who have been killed, the majority of whom are children, in Gaza.

The United States has sent weapons and now soldiers to aid Israel. Whatever your politics, I hope you will join us to listen and learn, and let us be ceaseless in prayer for peace.

Our hospitality in hosting this and other events that promote relationship and reconciliation, while not without risk, is our way of saying we need to talk with each other.

As we enter a second season of singing and praying about the land of the birth of Jesus, may we swell the angel chorus proclaiming peace.

Warren's Wonderings

Images of Gaza bring back memories

Warren is a Fellow of the American Academy of Experts in Traumatic Stress.

The images of Gaza remind me of traveling in Bosnia and Hercegovina from Split over the dirt road of Diamond Route into Gornji Vakuf. It was shocking to see the devastation. It was memorable to meet the security leader of that village who invited me to speak to the youth attending the sports camp for mixed ethnic children living in the Central Bosnian area.

Yes, Gaza, Lebanon, Israel as places of war remind me of the experience the children of all ages had during those years. As I prepared to speak to the youth, I remembered the concepts that we had learned through the war experience of World War II to the present.

In WWII, they called traumatic stress battle fatigue "shell shock." They weren't quite sure how to deal with it. But the body, mind and spirit is an amazingly resilient organism.

At the end of one's tour of duty in WWII,

combat units of the Armed Forces often returned home via ships — ships that took days to travel, days that enabled the group to decompress, share hope, recalibrate, and they returned to a predominately adoring community.

The experience of Vietnam was much different. While the military had learned that one, on average, could face only so many days of stress, they flew people back and forth in a way that resulted in less unit bonding. And when they returned home, they did so to a confused community.

We learned that traumatic stress was defined as a life-threatening experience to oneself, family, community. And two factors that affected the impact included the type of event(s) and the support system.

The conflicts of Ukraine and Russia and that of Israel, Palestine and Lebanon carry much mixed meaning.

In all of this we pray for peace. As a caring community we are called by Paul in Galatians, 6:2, "Bear one another's burden."

We know that there are many different

perspectives regarding the areas of conflict. I invite us to be available to listen to our differences and embrace our brothers and sisters who walk in different communities.

Paul adds, "Be kindly in tribulation."

So, one way in which we can help another who is experiencing traumatic stress, is to be supportive of his or her journey, listen and suggest he/she talk with one who is experienced in working with trauma.

A way of taking care of ourselves in watching the war scenes is to scribble! And to offer the paper to Jesus and ask that he take it.

Oh, yes, in conclusion, while presenting to the youth in Bosnia, I asked the security chief, can you live with the other groups. He said, "We know specifically who harmed us; they are not welcome. Our other neighbors with differences are welcome back to rebuild our peace."

Unresolved trauma often results in violence towards oneself or towards others. A supportive community can help traumatized folk move toward healing.

Chocolate Fest shines in new format

Everything old is new again, as the saying goes, and Chocolate Fest — after 41 years — took on a whole new look in 2024.

For this new, all-in-one day version, guests were asked to choose a two-hour tasting time slot that helped us manage the crowds that were a factor last year.

We also moved about half the 22 vendors into the Sanctuary where pews were removed and drapes hung from the rafter to define the space. The Silent Auction table held a prominent spot in the middle.

This year the prize drawings took place on the half-hour each hour, and the improved sound system allowed winners to hear their numbers called.

That break every hour was especially welcome for the jazz trio. Michael Medwid played the drums for the whole eight hours, but he rotated in other musicians to join him throughout the day.

And vendors, instead of paying a flat fee, were asked to donate 10 percent of their sales.

For most of these innovations, Chocolate Fest chair Jill Visor listened to the comments of the vendors and volunteers from last year and adapted this traditional benefit to fit.

This was also the first year that Chocolate Fest designated a single charity to receive half the proceeds instead of spreading the funds over several different groups. This year the benefit goes to LifeMoves, the organization that houses the unhoused on the Peninsula. LifeMoves had an information table set up in the Sanctuary.

How did we do financially? Chocolate Fest netted more than \$23,000 and should clear more than \$17,000.

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

Disaster recovery benefits from CCP

Natural disasters from coast to coast have been a constant news item recently. Hurricanes in the southeastern U.S. and fires in northern California were relentless and unforgiving as homes, businesses and infrastructure collapsed.

The Social Action Board chose the following three organizations to receive financial support for the work being done to support the individuals affected by these catastrophic events

The North Valley Community Foundation in Chico, founded in 1989 is an umbrella foundation administering grants to various organizations supporting communities in Northern California. In recent years the numerous fires in Butte County — Camp, Paradise, Dixie and Park fires — have been a special focus. In addition to immediate financial need to replace basic supplies, NVCF recognizes the need for mental health services for people affected by the fires.

Currently there are 25 organizations on the website that receive grants from NVCF. They include:

Early Childhood Mental Health, Learning & Recovery Fund and First 5

- These two organizations address the needs of families with young children who have been displaced and traumatized by the fires. Suicide prevention, especially among young people, is addressed in these programs.


Wildfire Relief and Recovery Fund

 This fund raises money to support nonprofits and agencies that provide immediate assistance to evacuees and animals impacted by fires in Butte County.

Indigenous Communities Impact Fund – This agency ensures that equitable support is given to support sustainability and prosperity in the indigenous community.

Moms on the Ridge is a non-profit organization in Paradise that supports families with children offering essentials such as diapers, formula, family friendly activities to relieve mental stress caused by the fires.

The United Church of Christ has a long history of supporting communities as they recover from disasters. With the onslaught of the latest two hurricanes, UCC mobilized to send resources and support. The denomination is communicating with



conferences in the areas affected by the recent hurricanes to determine the needs of the communities.

On Sept. 26, Hurricane Helene made landfall in Florida and traveled north delivering devastating losses of homes, businesses and infrastructure. Electricity did not exist to operate oxygen tanks, refrigerate insulin and other life sustaining operations. So far, the death toll has surpassed 230; many people are still missing. To add to the misery,

Hurricane Milton crashed into Florida two weeks later.




